



FROM THE PRESIDENT & THE BOARD CHAIR

I am proud to share with you, our partners, REDEC's 2023 Annual Report. REDEC had another successful year supporting small businesses in Chemung, Steuben, Schuyler and Tioga counties. During the past year, REDEC's Board of Directors authorized the borrowing of an additional \$300,000 from the US Small Business Administration to continue providing micro loans in the region. Commercial lending rates in some cases doubled over the past year, and lending slowed considerably both residentially and commercially. The financial needs of small business in our region need to be met, and REDEC is able to continue meeting that demand. REDEC issued 17 new loans totaling \$527,000, a 35% increase over 2022. REDEC's administration of the eight-county STREDC loan fund provided 11 loans totaling almost \$2,500,000. These funds supported downtown redevelopment projects and agricultural projects throughout the Southern Tier region.

REDEC is prepared for the future with ample financial resources and professional staff to assist businesses as they navigate the array of programs and services designed to help new and expanding businesses. REDEC has access to commercial lenders, economic development officials, and government leaders throughout the Southern Tier. These partnerships add to our strength and sustainability as we conclude our 43rd year.

2024 promises to be an interesting year. REDEC is here and prepared to help keep business doors open and to assist entrepreneurs in opening new ones.




LOANS BY COUNTY

While a shave and a haircut are no longer "two bits," the quality of service remains the same.






BULL'S EYE SALOON

EDEC provided financing in conjunction with a regional bank to support the startup of Bull's Eye Saloon in Hornellsville, with a grand opening planned for early 2024. REDEC funds were used to redevelop a vacant 10,500 square foot commercial building. The property once served as the Hornell Eagle 's Club, and most recently as a commercial RV center.

Bull's Eye Saloon will provide a recreational axe throwing bar to fill an entertainment void in the Hornell area. The business goal is to create an entertainment environment that will attract adults aged 21 and above, with the largest customer base being individuals who choose to participate in a league, just like bowling. The axe throwing trend is new to the area and growing quickly across the country. With a properly built venue, the business plans to host World Ave Throwing League competitions, attracting visitors from beyond the immediate region. The business will be able to host alternate revenue streams, such as private events, birthday parties, bachelor or bachelorette, corporate team building retreats.



REDEC participated in their most recent project, which also received funding from a New York State Downtown Revitalization Initiative grant awarded by Empire State Development. The project, also funded by a STREDC loan, is redeveloping a long vacant grocery store into a mixed use commercial residential facility.

In addition to three new residential units, the commercial space was developed to house Owego Donut and Beer. REDEC provided an SBA Micro Loan to fund equipment to support not just donut making, but a NYC-style deli, and a 20-tap automated beverage (craft beer, craft cider, etc.) dispensing system. The name alone will draw customers in for a look, see and taste. Redevelopment of this highly trafficked location makes local officials and neighbors happy for the investment.



HUNGRY BURD






he closure of two restaurants during COVID in the Village of Burdett left residents with limited options when looking to gather for a meal. Rising from the ashes of the vacant Smokin' Bones restaurant, Briana Colunio opened Hungry Burd restaurant at 3815 Main Street, Burdett.

Colunio, a lifelong resident of Burdett, was familiar with the front end of business operations having worked as a server

at Smokin' Bones for the past 17 years. She gained backroom experience, managing her own commercial cleaning business that helped her prepare a sound business plan to secure financing.

REDEC provided an SBA Micro Loan to purchase kitchen equipment and partnered with SCOPED financing to reopen the doors of the vacant establishment with a new face and new menu.





JIM'S GYM

im's Gym is a successful membership fitness center located at 754 Baldwin Street, Elmira. Jim Wheaton founded the business in 2015 and relocated it to Baldwin Street in 2018 with financial assistance from REDEC to purchase and redevelop a vacant facility, acquire additional equipment, and transform the building into a fitness center.

Jim's Gym is the only fitness center in the region that offers boxing classes as part of its fitness training. After surviving multiple mandated shutdowns during COVID, Jim's has rebounded nicely, adding boxing classes which are all at capacity. In 2023, REDEC provide an SBA Micro Loan and additional funding in partnership with STEG's City of Elmira Loan Fund to expand the boxing footprint and add more capacity. Boxing classes are offered to adults and youth separately and are about fitness training, not prize fighting. Bonnie Mann, retired US Marine and Boxing Hall of Fame inductee, leads the boxing classes.

Any business will tell you that repeat customers are the best. Jim's Gym fits that mold. ■



LUCKY HARE

EDEC has supported Lucky Hare Brewing from its inception in an old barn in Hector overlooking Seneca Lake, to the development of one of the region's largest farm breweries in Schuyler County's Ultra-Premium Beverage Facility in the Town of Dix. With shelf space in grocery stores and commercial beverage facilities extremely competitive, Lucky Hare has sought ways to get its beer into customers' hands by opening taprooms in Hector, Ithaca, and now Owego. Lucky Hare recently secured a lease with the Schuyler County IDA to further expand its offerings in downtown Watkins Glen's Seneca Harbor Marina.

Lucky Hare has successfully entrenched its beers in the Upstate craft beer market. Expanding into food and hospitality at its tap room locations will keep the premium beer flowing. The Finger Lakes, known for its vineyards and wineries, has rapidly become a premier location to enjoy craft beer within the same beautiful environment enjoyed by wine enthusiasts.

REDEC provided SBA Micro Loans to support Lucky Hare's expansion into Owego. ■





n 2021, REDEC assisted Matt Towner, Towner Development, LLC, to acquire and begin renovations to the former Erwin Town Hall at West Water Street, Painted Post. The 17,333 square foot historic building was built as a town hall in 1921. The STREDC Community Reinvestment Loan Program, administered by REDEC, has assisted with the redevelopment of vacant downtown buildings throughout the Southern Tier for the past decade. The redevelopment project was eligible for both federal and state historic tax credits.

Two years into the building renovation, which included the creation of two store fronts, second floor commercial space, and several third story apartments, Matt Towner sought assistance with securing an iCode franchise to compliment the other store front, Towner's existing Empire Bricks, a Lego retail business. REDEC provided an SBA Micro Loan to assist with establishing the new franchise, including considerable furnishings and computer equipment.

iCode provides STEM education and computer coding education in the region. Basic computer programming skills are taught through hands-on projects that teach students time management, teamwork, presentation, and communication skills all in a fun learning environment. iCode contracts with area schools to provide the STEM education services as well as individual families seeking an opportunity to give their children a learning opportunity not available in schools.

LENDER'S ROUNDTABLE

REDEC staff were joined by more than 60 regional small business supporters for a Lenders' Round Table to learn from each other how organizations can partner their resources to sustain small business growth in the region. The Lenders' Roundtable was the first held in the region in a decade and brought together representatives of regional banks and economic development organizations to learn about services and funding programs available to entrepreneurs and small business owners.

REDEC President George Miner served as moderator and reviewed loan programs available through both REDEC and STREDC. Ashleigh Madison, Executive Director of IncubatorWorks and Michael Herceg, Business Advisor of the Small Business Development Center (SBDC) at Binghamton University shared how their organizations support entrepreneurs and new business start ups with training and support services. Grace Connors, Lender Relations Specialist from the Small Business Administration-Syracuse District Office presented various SBA loan programs offered through regional banks, as well as the Micro Loan Program administered by REDEC.
